Māori and Pasifika whanau engagements in the New Year: Unfortunately, the second lockdown impacted on our planned get-togethers with our Māori and Pasifika whanau. Rather than re-schedule dates into an already full Term 4 programme, we will be hosting engagements with our Māori and Pasifika whanau early in the new year as part of a more comprehensive approach to engaging with our school community. We apologise for any inconvenience caused by this rescheduling. A 2021 Calendar of Key Dates is being prepared and will be circulated to all our families well in advance to assist with planning.

School lunches:

Edendale is a Water Only School. Drinking water during the day helps children to focus on their learning. Remind your child to fill up their water bottle every day before coming to school. Please do NOT send any other drinks to school. Water from the tap is much more sustainable than drinks in cartons and bottles.

Healthy Zero Waste Lunchboxes. Children need good food to fuel their brains and bodies for learning. Please make the time to plan for a healthy lunchbox. Breads, rice, pasta and other leftovers combined with some vegetables and fruit provide a cheap and healthy lunch. Keep your lunchbox waste free by putting food in compartment containers or wrapping food in a beeswax wrap, reusable bag or no wrap at all. To avoid chip bags and seaweed packets, try popcorn. Popcorn kernels are found in most supermarket bulk bins and once popped, keep for three days in a sealed container.

Dry ice experiments: The Tuakana Team had heaps of fun experimenting with dry ice (solid carbon dioxide) this week. We had 'bubbling' cylinders, self-inflating balloons, instant ice-cream, and frozen bubbles. Sublimation is so interesting! Amanda R19
