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This week we are going to hunt for bugs in the garden. If you don't have a garden, go hunting on google search or when you go for your walk at the park or around the block. You should recognise these from our garden at school.

2. Next, write a sentence on what you can remember about these insects/bugs. I have given you some clues from our conversations at school. If you cant remember, ask your parents/grandparents or google search, how these insects/bugs help or don't help in the garden.

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- What can you plant in the garden in early April? Time to have all your winter vege in.

From Punnets: Winter veges in like: Broccoli, Cabbages, Onions (Red and Brown), Peas, Cauliflower, Celery, Silverbeet, kale and carrots. Also you can still get more lettuces, rocket and radishes in, if you are quick.

Seeds to sow: Beetroot, Broadbeans, Carrots, Cabbages, Coriander, Lettuces, Peas, radishes and silverbeet.

1st April - 7th April - plant your broadbeans.

8th - 14th April - plant your carrots.

23rd - 30th plant your second lot of brassicas i.e. broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and kale.

We have planted a lot of these at school and hopefully they will survive while we are away.

- Seed Collecting that you can do at home.

Please note. When you put the seeds on the handytowels, make sure you remove any pulp and only leave the seed.
